## **Equality at Platanos College**

Our whole school assembly focused on Equality and Diversity this week. Two of our Equality Champions, Gisela Fernandes and Zara Ahmed, addressed our entire school community with two very informative speeches on the topic.

Should we be treated differently because of our age, gender, class, race or sexual orientation? It's a simple answer: no.

Everyone is different and we should take pride in ourselves.

A group of us attended a 6-week training course recently on Equality. During this training we learnt about many different situations that have occurred related to human rights. For me, it was a real eye opener as I was oblivious to how many problems our society faces today due to human rights issues. We grasped the idea of how to tackle these everyday situations.

This subject has been tackled before by legends such as Martin Luther King Jr, an American activist and leader in the African civil rights movement; John F. Kennedy, an American politician who served as the 35<sup>th</sup> President of the United States; or Emmeline Pankhurst, a British political activist and leader of the British suffragette movement who helped women win the right to vote. There have been many more freedom fighters in the past and we should learn from them.

Age discrimination is also a big issue. All ages can be discriminated against. It affects not only the people who are discriminated against, but also those who lose valuable relationships by judging them based on age. Ageism can occur in the workplace, old and young workers are sometimes both overlooked, but what those employers do not see is experience, knowledge, passion and new ideas.

Sexism, what does it actually mean? The Oxford Dictionary states that sexism is prejudice, stereotyping or discrimination, typically against women. However, sexism can also affect boys. People are different, some might take the issue personally and others might brush it aside. Many people also believe that sexism has been eradicated and women and men have achieved full equality, yet sexual harassment, assault and similar situations still occur.

By acting differently and against these stereotypes it can bring about positive change and we as a school community should lead by example. My aim of speaking at this assembly today was to open your eyes to see how our actions can affect the lives of others.
