The Tribute to Andrew Lloyd Webber Concert will be streaming for free from Friday 1st May on the 'The Shows Must Go On' channel via *youtube*.

The 1998 filmed event featured many well-known hits from his musicals, performed by stars such as Michael Ball (who duetted with Captain Tom Moore for our current number 1 in the charts.) Other stars include Glenn Close, Boyzone and Antonio Banderas (of *Puss In Boots* fame from *Shrek*!)

Giants of the Acting World to help students with Shakespeare Texts for the RSC

A brand new scheme from the RSC will see famous actors help students in lockdown. Tamsin Greig, Noma Dumezweni and Patrick Stewart have launched RSC Homework Help – a new and creative way for students to better engage with Shakespeare's works.

Students will be able to submit their Shakespeare-related questions to the actors (with David Bradley, Charlotte Arrowsmith, Paapa Essiedu, Niamh Cusack and David Tennant also involved) online, with custom-made responses following afterwards. The actors involved will answer any about Shakespeare and theatre generally.

Titian Behind Closed Doors

In the winter of 1550, the most famous painter in Europe came face to face with a prince who was soon to become the most powerful man on earth. What emerged from this encounter between Prince Philip of Spain and the Renaissance master Titian is seen as one of the most extraordinary commissions in all of art history. Given almost total creative freedom and limitless time, Titian returned a series of six extraordinary masterpieces and reinvented painting in the process.

Dispersed over the centuries, these six paintings have not been seen together for over 450 years, and it has long been a dream of art lovers to reunite them just as Titian had intended.
