


## **Platanos College Remembers**

# His Royal Highness Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh



## Our Whole School Assembly Reflection

Delivered in Whole School Assembly on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> April 2021.

Having a sense of duty is something that we all have at different points in our lives.

As members of your community, it might be of care to a grandparent, parent, carer, sibling or friend.

As a teacher it may be to the pupils that we impart knowledge and aim to develop.

As human beings it might be to our fellow man, to share love and compassion.

A sense of duty is having responsibility to assist and help others. Something that our Muslim staff, pupils, and Muslims worldwide remind themselves of during this holy period of Ramadan.

The world was reminded of an example of what duty looks like very recently, with the death of Our Majesty the Queen's consort and husband, His Royal Highness, Prince Philip the Duke of Edinburgh.

To fulfil a duty requires sacrifice. A sacrifice of our own interests so as to

help other people. It can be difficult – quite often our selfish wants conflict with carrying out our duties to others. To be dutiful then, can be rather challenging.

Prince Philip was a prime example of someone who would appear to have everything – he was a member of the Royal Family for example – a symbol of wealth, privilege and grandeur.

However, as a baby his family became refugees, he was as good as orphaned by his father and by his mother being sent to a mental institution for schizophrenia. He had a seemingly lonely childhood.

Through good will and the charity of his extended family he was able to receive an outstanding education and was set to have a career in the Royal Navy — in fact he did serve his adoptive country — the United Kingdom — during the Second World War — an example of the utmost duty in itself.

King George VI agreed to the marriage of Philip to the Princess Elizabeth – the next in line to the throne of the United Kingdom and the commonwealth. In doing this, Philip had to sacrifice his Greek nationality, his surname and his career in the Royal Navy.

The hopes and dreams of a young man were changed when he married Queen Elizabeth. In a time when men were the patriarchs and heads of their family, Philip had to be subservient to the monarch – that was not only his wife – but was his chief and commander. He had to serve the Queen as her partner and as a servant to the Crown.

It is widely accepted that Prince Philip struggled with this unexpected role – he had his own pathway in his mind. But, as part of a generation who had

lived through the Second World War, he understood what a sense of duty was. Something that generations since, have struggled more to adopt given the pressures of consumerism which results in selfishness and greed.

Prince Philip devoted his life to his wife and monarch, Her Majesty the Queen. He helped to modernise the Royal Family – helping them to be more approachable and relevant to the everchanging face and population of the United Kingdom. However, more importantly, he saw that he had a key role – an important duty – to use his privilege to help the world.

Prince Philip was very much ahead of his time – meaning that issues that receive a lot of media attention today – he was addressing 50 years before:

- The importance of the environment and the problems of climate change
- Improving interfaith relations
- Improving the lives of young people.

His outspokenness on issues made some people feel uncomfortable – and therefore rather than headline his charitable work, the headlines in the media would often focus on faux pas or the times that he seemed impatient or belligerent, as if he were any different to anyone of us in the vices that we all have.

His legacy will be that of a champion of modernisation, charitable work, and good humour with it.

His legacy will be that of an example of sacrifice and duty towards others.

His legacy will be that of a loved father and grandfather.

His legacy will be that of a prime example of a leader to others.

Grief and mourning are emotions that all of us know all too well, especially given the last year. In that respect, let us think of our Queen, Elizabeth II, who has lost her husband, confidant, best friend of 73 years; of His Royal Highness, Prince Charles, the Prince of Wales – the heir to Elizabeth II and to his brothers and sister; to the grandchildren of his Royal Highness, Prince Philip and to all affected by his death.

In particular the thoughts and prayers of Platanos College go to His Royal Highness Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex, who is the Master of the Worshipful Company of Fuellers, and son of Prince Philip. The Worshipful Company of Fuellers have continued to work in partnership with our school and the Platanos Trust in enriching the lives of you, our pupils.

We joined our nation in respect and remembrance by holding a minute's silence and by listening to our National Anthem.


A Prince, a Veteran, A father, a husband, An orphan, a man, Of few words, but he would humbly stand,
