Literacy at Platanos College

At Platanos College we place significant importance upon literacy across the curriculum. Two areas in which literacy is promoted at present are: Drop Everything and Read and our Accelerated Reader programme. Not only do pupils have a dedicated form time each week in which to read their class novel, at Key Stage 3 they also have one hour each week of Accelerated Reader.




Accelerated Reader is a programme that the school has been using for a number of years with huge success.

Pupils take an initial test to determine their reading skill and this then books generates specific recommended for each individual pupil. When pupils have completed reading their recommended book they then complete a quiz on the book in order to recall, comprehend and analyse. The result of the quiz can also determine whether they have raised their reading after which thev will recommended more challenging texts. Not only do pupils enjoy the competitive nature of the guizzes, they also benefit from this dedicated reading time. The benefits of reading are vast: cognitive and language development, expanded vocabulary and a prolonged attention span.

Children who read at least 20 minutes a day are exposed to almost 2 million words

On Monday mornings pupils, 'Drop Everything and Read'. Across Key

Stage 3, at 10.45am all pupils put down their work and pick up a book. Pupils enjoy this interval from their studies so that they can spend some time reading and exploring the worlds within their chosen text. Reading daily has been proven to benefit children and young adults in particular.

History Month

The theme for this year's History month was 'London'. As one of the most historic, diverse and famous cities in the world we are lucky to live in a place that can teach us so much about the history of humanity. Our school reflects the diverse community of London in that we have different ethnicities, different cultures, different languages and different accents.

As a school we are proud to live in a city that has birthed some remarkable individuals and has produced some truly significant events. However, many people who have contributed to the history of London are unknown. We have used History month this year to put faces on London's hidden heroes and names to some of the lesser known events. In this way we allow our pupils to see History as the story of all humanity and enable them to search out history that is not always focused on.

We have marked History month this year in a number of ways.

Firstly, pupils were introduced to this year's theme through assemblies. Pupils and staff discussed important, overlooked individuals and events that have shaped London. These ranged from Mary Seacole to Ellen and William Craft.

Additionally, all Key Stage Three pupils had a PFL History lesson which focused on how forgotten individuals who have shaped London's history these included Jacques Francis and Barbara Burford. Their learning continued in their History lessons when they analysed lesser known events that have shaped the city such as the Battle of Cable Street and the creation of London Pride.

Also, Friday registrations throughout this month looked at case studies of a number of individuals who lived in London and changed the city that we live in. These case studies included people such as Dr Harold Moody, an important campaigner for racial equality in the UK.

Finally, group we ran а tutor competition in which students can create a display piece about an important Londoner who isn't usually studied in History. We will celebrate all pupils' submissions through debates, presentations and discussion within the tutor groups. All students who submit a display piece will be merited to reward their great work and each tutor will choose their top display piece before the History department selects a gold, silver and bronze winner from each year group.

We hope that pupils found this to be an informative and enjoyable History

month that broadened the students' understanding of the contribution of forgotten individuals and events in shaping the London that we live in today.

Prevent Workshop

The year 9 pupils participated in the Prevent Workshop from Monday 18th October 2021 until Friday 22nd October 2021.

The pupils were led through an online programme of work that uses presentations and information-based exploration of the words Racism, Extremism, Terrorism, the Far Right and Islamism as particularly connected to the Prevent Agenda.

The work enabled the pupils to acquire an understanding and knowledge that will provide them with an awareness to safely challenge extreme views and beliefs that could impact on a cohesive community in their school, and its' surrounding areas.

The pupils were given, through the workshop, information connected to the historical context of racism, religion, extremist organisations and their ideologies and, alongside Reveal's experienced practitioners, learnt to "unpick" the extreme ideologies connected to both Far Right and Islamist Organisation.



Extra-curricular clubs and enrichment

It has been an absolute delight and extremely encouraging to see so many pupils engaged in a number of different clubs and activities across the 26 clubs currently on offer. As a school we would like to offer more clubs and enrichment opportunities and hope this is possible in the near future.

There are currently 26 clubs in full operation with 384 pupils in KS3 attending clubs. The clubs currently on offer are History 'Fact and Fiction' club, Computer 'Robotics', St. John's and CCF Army Cadets, Reading, Drama, Spanish Club and Science STEM Club. The PE department offer Table tennis, Basketball, Netball and boys' and girls' football club.



On 15th December 100 Year 8 students travelled to New Wimbledon Theatre to watch the pantomime classic 'Dick Whittington.'


