Year 9 Media Trip

In March 20 pupils from Year 9 were taken to visit FTI Consulting for a series of media workshops in line with Young Citizens.

The day consisted of three parts:

- 1. Types of media
- 2. Defining and identifying fake news
- 3. Pupils presenting what they had learnt



Pupils were quizzed on the evolution of different types of media throughout history, from town criers and the first newspapers, to social media and apps. They were shocked to find out that there were only four channels on TV in the 1980s!

In the second session, pupils explored several case studies that involved 'fake news', one story being centred around Woolworths reopening! Pupils were then given the opportunity to write their own sensationalised fake news story about a shampoo company. This allowed them to put their creativity and writing skills to the test as they tried to create the most dramatic and fake story possible. The volunteers then equipped pupils with the knowledge on how to identify and verify fake news.



Following lunch, pupils then created presentations to summarise everything they had learnt. The presentations were well planned, researched and delivered, with lots of pupils developing their confidence and public speaking.

It was a great trip and pupils learnt lots of facts and strategies they can use in their day-to-day life when interacting with media.

Debate Club Urban Debate League

This term has been a busy one for Debate Mate. There have been 2 rounds of the Urban Debate League for pupils in year 7, year 8 and year 9. Year 10 Debate Mate Accelerate pupils were successful in their round and won both of their debates on the day! Pupils were up against teams from other schools where they showed fantastic sportsmanship, debating skills and team work. It was a truly enjoyable experience for all pupils involved. We look forward to a continued winning streak by the year 10 pupils and further success from our Key Stage 3 teams.



Pupils have expressed how they initially joined Debate Mate to have fun after school, they added that they have enjoyed the competitions immensely and believe they have acquired effective arguing skills.

When asked, pupils commented on the range of different debating topics that they have enjoyed from environmental issues to mental health. Extra-curricular clubs and enrichment

Our pupils have revelled and thrived in taking up the opportunity to do extracurricular and enrichment clubs. There has been a substantial increase in the participation numbers for Physical Education Clubs; complemented by the opportunity to play competitively against other schools and put their skills into action.

A number of matches having taken place for netball, boys' basketball, boys' and girls' football and boys' indoor athletics across the Spring term. The pupils are richer for the opportunity to hone their skills in a pressured environment.

The History 'Fact and Fiction' club, Computer 'Robotics', Debate Mate, Writing Academy and CCF Army Cadets, Reading, Drama, Spanish Club and Science STEM Club are in full swing.

History Fact & Fiction Club:

This half term pupils explored a variety of historical perspectives spanning from our studies of Chinese dynasties in the 4th Century, all the way to 20th Century Britain, when we looked at the experiences of young men during World War One. Our pupils discussed each film through the context of its historical past and made valuable contributions about the fact and fiction of each narrative.

MFL (Spanish Club):

During this term pupils attending the MFL homework club, have been doing a variety of activities to develop their listening and speaking skills:

- -Listening to authentic Spanish radio programmes, music and podcasts.
- -Playing 'snake and ladders' and 'the unfair game' in order to develop their spontaneous communication skills in the target language.
- -Using vocabulary and conversational cards to improve their fluency when speaking in the target language.



STEM Club (Year 7):

Pupils have been introduced to key Science concepts such as Centre of Mass, Elasticity and Stretching forces. What has been enjoyed by them is the opportunity for them to play around with the equipment relating to the concepts, understand the application in everyday life and then apply their conceptual ability to articulate the scientific concept associated with this.

What has been particularly impressive has been witnessing the ability of these pupils who with some helpful scaffolding were able to state the scientific laws involved - something KS4 pupils have to be pushed to define.

STEM Club (year 8 & 9):

Pupils have been very enthused by the activities done and have performed to a very good standard.

These activities included Making salts, neutralisation, Acid rain, using scientific apparatus for titration, making soap bubbles stronger. We are planning the start of the science project 'Stem Kart' in collaboration with STEM.

Pupils have truly benefited from the essential balance extra-curricular and enrichment clubs afford them.

Equality and Diversity Workshop

Year 7 and 8 pupils participated in an Equality and Diversity Workshop on 30th March 2022, which was presented by Julie Wilkinson from Brave the Rage organisation.

Escape Room – Year 7

Sutton Life Centre

As a part of the Year 7 trips to enhance learning programme 19 year 7 pupils attended the Sutton Life Centre on Tuesday 29th April 2022.

The Sutton Life Centre in an interactive centre using audio-visual equipment to young people explore and address the dangers and risks currently present in society. The pupils were broken into small groups and taken on a tour of the venue, whilst on the tour they took part in interactive workshops focused on the following areas:

- Knife crime
- Bullying
- Using public transport safely
- Recycling
- Energy use
- Importance of a balanced diet
- Safety signs and hazards
- Fire safety

All the pupils engaged well with the workshops and the tour representing the school in a positive manner with their behaviour and level of focus. After the tour and workshops the hosts recapped the important information before conducting a quiz, giving away free water bottles to the pupils who answered correctly. The pupils impressed the hosts with the amount of information that they had absorbed and quickly answered all the questions correctly. All pupils and staff then ate lunch together, it was great to watch pupils and staff socialising whilst eating their packed lunches and discussing their experiences from the morning.

The journey to and from the Sutton Life Centre took close to an hour including a tube journey and bus journey, the pupils displayed exemplary conduct throughout the journey representing the school in a such a positive manner that members of the public went out of their way to complement the manner in which the pupils were conducting themselves.

Clue Quest Escape Rooms

On the 29th of March 2022, 9A and 9B went to Clue Quest Escape Room. We left the school and travelled by the underground to Kings Cross Station. Within a 15-minute walk, we arrived at the location.

Separated into groups of six, we went into the room. We completed a variety of puzzles which enabled us to find objects by exploring the room. We often used these objects to help figure out numbers, opening drawers and hidden compartments. For example, we used playing cards to determine a 4 digit code and found pieces of lego throughout the experience to find out particular codes. For the full experience, we were allowed to ask for clues, which were presented like riddles, so we could proceed to the next task.

First big scare over, the pupils later found themselves walking down a catwalk with the likes of Dame Judi Dench, Morgan Freeman, Nicole Kidman and many other award-winning actors. Each wax work was entirely handmade and made to measure, meaning they were the celebrity's exact height and width.

Later, the pupils got to meet some of their favourite movie characters including the Marvel heroes, King Kong, the Hunger Games, all things Star Wars and many more. There was even an Alien section, where pupils had to pass through the wreckage of an abandoned space ship and come face to face with a huge Alien, which was the second big jump of the day!

Pupils have responded really positively to participation in the school's orchestra and the orchestra is currently working hard to prepare for the school's summer concert at which they will perform.




KS3 Reading Programme

This term we are pleased to announce that we have introduced a paired reading scheme whereby selected Year 9 pupils have been paired with selected Year 7 pupils to support them with their reading. Each Year 7 pupil taking part in the scheme reads with their Year 9 mentor twice a week during registration.

The aim of this programme is to boost the Year 7s' confidence, reading ability and enjoyment of reading whilst at the same time developing key employability skills and sense of responsibility in Year 9 pupils. All Year 9 pupils involved in the programme received specialist training from the school's EdPsychs Team- this team is composed of the school's Educational Psychologist and two full-time Assistant Psychologists.

The scheme has really taken off and has received excellent feedback from staff and pupils.
