Year 10 Macbeth Trip



On Friday 11th March, the whole of Year 10 visited Shakespeare's world-renowned Globe Theatre to watch one of the playwright's most celebrated tragedies and English Literature GCSE text: Macbeth.

After a short tube journey and windy walk across Blackfriars bridge, the students arrived in the buzz of the authentic openair theatre, filled with over 1,500 local school children. With tickets in the theatre's yard (standing area), Platanos College pupils were situated in the heart of the action, just inches away from the Shakespearean-style wooden stage that had been artistically transformed into a ragged, muddy bog to enhance the play's natural Scottish setting.

As the play began, pupils were drawn in by the vibrant dancing, dynamic fight scenes and interesting use of music and sound that brought the scenes they have been reading during their English lessons to life. Despite heavy rain, the students persevered admirably to gain a truly authentic Shakespearean experience of open-air theatre that added to the atmosphere of the tragic play!

To support your child to effectively study at home, here are a few tips:



- Offer to help them create a revision timetable and to assist with them sticking to it. Remember that the earlier your child begins to revise, the better they will feel when it comes to the exams and the better chance they have of getting the grades they are capable of.
- As parents/ carers, one of the most important roles is to make home life as calm and supportive as possible for your child; especially at such a stressful and emotionally charged period. Your interest, support and worlds of encouragement will play a vital role in helping your child remain calm and focused at this important period. When your child feels worried or stressed, listen to their concerns, help them to keep perspective and encourage them to keep trying.
- Getting enough sleep is also essential to performing well during exam season. A good night sleep will ensure your child arrives to school well rested, calm, energised and alert. It will also give them the best chance to learn and retain information. By the same token, encourage your child to put down all technology 30 minutes before bed, as the blue light emitted can significantly interfere with sleep patterns.
- Whilst revising or studying it's important that distractions are eliminated and firm boundaries around screen time needs to be set to ensure learning time is maximised.
- Food is also vitally important during revision and exams. Food and drinks

- rich in sugar and caffeine (i.e. chocolates/sweets, fizzy drinks, energy drinks etc.) causes unproductive highs, followed by even worse lows.
- Ensure your child have a quiet place to revise, away from any distractions.
 This will help to decrease stress and create a good environment for them.
- Ensure you child arrive to school on time for their exams. There are no allowances for late arrivals. External exams can only be taken at the scheduled examination time.

We wish our Year 11 pupils every success in their upcoming GCSE examinations and we look forward to celebrating their success in August 2022.

Kooth - online counselling service for young people



Kooth Is a free online counselling and emotional wellbeing support service available to all young people aged 11-25 in Lambeth.

Young people accessing Kooth can:

- Book virtual drop-ins and chat sessions with experienced counsellors
- Seek support or advice on any topic, from coping with exam stress or bullying, help with an eating disorder, dealing with suicidal thoughts or handling sexual abuse.
- Browse through a wide range of selfhelp materials
- Share their experience through live moderated forums
- Track their thoughts and feeling through journals and goal trackers

There are no thresholds or waiting lists, they simply register on the Kooth website to start receiving help and young people can access the service 365 days a year, from 12 noon until 10 pm weekdays, and 6pm until 10pm weekends.



Year 10 Money Management Workshop



The week before the Easter break at Platanos College was a busy one. All year groups have a bespoke timetable that included: trips to enhance learning, workshops, subject drop down days and CHABOP day. Year 10 pupils had the opportunity to take part in a Money Management workshop on Tuesday 29th March.

On the day, pupils were split into groups and given two thousand pounds as their 'salary' for one month. Pupils were then asked to budget for one month. They had to take rent, bills, food, savings and other necessities into consideration when budgeting to see how much money they would be left with at the end of the month. Each team had very different ideas about how much it would cost per month to rent a room in London!

When pupils realised how much rent, bills and other necessities can cost each month, they considered their budgets quite differently.

Additionally, throughout the workshop, pupils were asked their opinion on a variety of money related situations. One such question posed to pupils was, "Do you think that borrowing money is ever a good thing?"

The majority of pupils stated that they thought it was never a good idea to borrow money. While this can be an intelligent response, pupils didn't realise that sometimes borrowing may be essential to be able to own property or a car. Pupils also discovered other aspects of borrowing to be aware of, such as interest

rates and different establishments that lend money such as Credit Unions.

Year 10 Equality and Diversity Workshop



Year 10 pupils attended an Equality and Diversity Workshop on Thursday 31st of March. There were many elements to the workshop. Topics covered included: The history of migration, British History, racial

equality, sexual equality among others. Pupils found the workshop engaging and informative.

Racial equality was discussed at length as well as the many stereotypes that exist around race. The facilitator drew on her own experiences of these stereotypes to provide pupils with an example of how anyone can be judged on their race or ethnicity.

Throughout the workshop pupils were reminded that living in London, we are surrounded by people from so many different races, religions, ethnicities and sexualities. We live in a diverse city, but even in a diverse city, racism still exists, inequality still exists, stereotyping still exists. Pupils were reminded of the negative impact that these situations can have on those who experience them. They were reminded that being open minded in their views is important.

Many pupils spoke out throughout the workshop and expressed their opinions and ideas around several of the topics that were covered. Towards the end of the session the pupils took part in a quiz on what they had covered in the session and it was clear that they had all gained valuable knowledge from the workshop.

Hamdi Mohamed said "The session was very interesting, educational and eye-opening. We learned many things about racial inequality around the world".

Year 11 Drama Trip

On Thursday the 24th February, the Drama year 11 cohort went to watch *Small Island* at The National Theatre. As part of their GCSE written exam, the pupils are expected to review a live performance of a published play. With the National just on our doorstep, a production at their multi-theatre venue seemed the obvious choice.

Small Island was performed in the largest theatre at the National, named after Laurence Olivier, (a name that went straight over most of our pupil's heads!) who was the first director at the National theatre as well as an actor who dominated the stage and screen of the 20th century. His statue can be found just outside the theatre, on the Southbank and became our group meeting place for the evening.

Inside the auditorium itself, pupils were stunned by the sheer size of the theatre, which can seat 1,150 people. With the seats full, it was time for the performance to begin where pupils enjoyed a spectacular theatrical version of the book *Small Island* written by Andrea Levy. This stunning production tells the story of how lives can cross paths due to war, immigration and attraction and deals with themes such as racism, prejudice, love and loss. The story takes place in both Jamaica and the UK, which made for a truly inspiring set design and scene transitions. The director Rufus Norris employed multiple lighting, sound and staging techniques that the pupils

were able to identify during the interval, whilst also tucking into their snacks!

After the show, all pupils commented on how well put together and how well acted the performance was and said they had a wonderful time experiencing a West-end London production as big as this.
